

The Development Trusts Association Scotland (DTAS) membership survey is carried out every 3 years in order to offer an insight into the people involved with and economic impact of the development trust movement in Scotland. This survey was completed in July 2016 and contains data from 220 DTAS members.



Membership

As at February 2017, DTA Scotland has 241 members. A total of **43,588** people are currently members of their local development trust. The average membership per development trust is **198** people.

This survey was completed in July 2016 and contains data from **220** DTAS members. **160** of these were completed and returned with the information from a further **60** organisations gleaned from desk-top research.



Board members

2,002 are currently serving on the boards of development trusts, with an average of **9 directors** per board.



Staff

There is a total of **751 people** employed by DTA Scotland members. This figure is made up of **558** full-time and **192** part-time positions.



Volunteers

Discounting board members, DTA Scotland members reported a total of **6,410 volunteers** with an average of **29 volunteers** per development trust. The estimated total number of volunteer hours given in a year is **541,122 hours** – at the Living Wage, this equates to a contribution worth **£3,896,078**; adding in board member hours, again at Living Wage, takes this figure to **£4,184,366**.



Income

Aggregated reported turnover was **£50.3 million** of which, self-generated or trading income accounted for **£21.1million** representing **42%** of turnover.



Regeneration contribution

The combined value of volunteer hours and self-generated income suggests that communities directly contribute over **£25million** towards regeneration activity in Scotland.
